

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

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

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26 A BILL

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31 IN THE COUNCIL OF DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

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35 To support the University of the District of Columbia to establish a Master of Social Work
36 degree pathway and to establish a scholarship program for District residents and
37 employees who are seeking higher education in behavioral health.

39 BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That this
40 act may be cited as the "Pathways to Behavioral Health Degrees Act of 2022".

42 Sec. 2. Definitions.

43 For the purposes of this subtitle, the term:

44 (1) “Accredited Master’s Degree” means an accredited master’s degree in
45 counseling, school counseling, clinical mental health counseling, social work or other masters’
46 degree programs accepted by the D.C. Board of Professional Counseling or the D.C. Board of
47 Social Work for the purposes of licensure in a behavioral health occupation.

48 (2) “Behavioral health and human services occupation” means an occupation that
49 requires a worker to be licensed as a Licensed Graduate Social Worker, Licensed Independent
50 Social Worker, Licensed Independent Clinical Social Worker, Licensed Professional Counselor,
51 or Licensed Graduate Professional Counselor.

52 (3) “DCPS” means the District of Columbia Public Schools.

53 (4) “Health care provider organization” means any entity licensed under federal,
54 state, or District law to provide health care services, including provider organizations certified by
55 the Department of Behavioral Health.

56 (5) “Local education agency” or “LEA” means the District of Columbia Public
57 Schools system, any individual District public charter school, or any group of public charter
58 schools operating under a single charter.

59 (6) “Program” means the Behavioral Health and Human Services Scholarship
60 Program established pursuant to this subtitle.

61 (7) “UDC” means the University of the District of Columbia.

62 Sec. 3. Scholarship Program.

63 (a)(1) There is established a Behavioral Health and Human Services Scholarship Program
64 to provide financial assistance to individuals who have bachelors’ degrees and seek to obtain an
65 accredited master’s degree and become licensed in a behavioral health or human services

66 occupation to work in District LEAs, government agencies, or health care provider
67 organizations.

68 (b) Through UDC, the Program shall provide:

69 (1) Education to District residents and employees that may lead to:

70 (A) The successful completion of coursework for a master's degree in an
71 accredited master's degree program needed to pursue a behavioral health and human services
72 occupation;

73 (B) Passage of licensure exams required to become licensed in a
74 behavioral health and human services occupation; and

75 (C) Hiring by District LEAs, District government agencies, or health care
76 provider organizations based in the District in a behavioral health and human services
77 occupation.

78 (2) Financial assistance to be awarded to Program participants enrolling in an
79 accredited master's degree program for payment of:

80 (A) Tuition at UDC, to the extent charged;

81 (B) Academic costs, including the cost of books and supplies; and

82 (C) A monthly stipend to be used toward living expenses and
83 transportation for participants pursuing master's degrees at UDC; and

84 (D) Fees associated with obtaining a license for a behavioral health
85 occupation in the District.

86 (c) UDC shall select individuals to enroll, or who are enrolled in UDC to participate in
87 the Program, consistent with the eligibility criteria established pursuant to section 4 of this act.

88 (d) Program marketing and public education shall be provided by UDC to attract District
89 residents and employees to the Program and for the duration of the Program.

90 (e)(1) Beginning with School Year 2024-2025, UDC shall begin using a portion of the
91 subsidy it receives from the District government for the Program to pay for the tuition, required
92 academic fees, required examination fees, and book and supply costs for individuals it selects to
93 participate in the Program.

94 (2) UDC also may use the subsidy it receives from the District government to pay:

95 (A) Salaries and fringe benefits of faculty and staff directly engaged in the
96 provision of courses necessary to obtain an accredited master's degree;

97 (B) For instructional materials used in courses necessary to obtain an
98 accredited master's degree; and

99 (C) For marketing and recruitment activities to attract individuals to the
100 Program at UDC.

101 Sec. 4. Program participant eligibility.

102 (a) To be eligible for financial assistance provided through the Program, an individual
103 shall:

104 (1) Meet the relevant enrollment requirements for an accredited master's degree at
105 UDC in which the individual enrolls;

106 (2)(A) Be a resident of the District;

107 (B) Be a graduate of a District public school; or

108 (C) Be employed by a District government agency or health care provider
109 organization;

110 (3) Be enrolled at UDC to complete coursework with the intent to pursue an
111 accredited master's degree necessary to obtain licensure in a behavioral health and human
112 services occupation in the District;

113 (4) Have a stated interest in pursuing a license in a behavioral health and human
114 services occupation and to work in a behavioral health or human services occupation in the
115 District;

116 (5) In exchange for accepting Program financial assistance, a Program participant
117 shall commit to working at a District LEA, government agency, or health care provider
118 organization for a minimum of 2 years after receiving an accredited master's degree and earning
119 the appropriate licensure or certification needed to practice in a behavioral health and human
120 services occupation in the District; and

121 (6) Meet other criteria as specified by UDC.

122 (b) To maintain eligibility for the Program, an individual shall:

123 (1) Maintain satisfactory academic progress, as determined by UDC;

124 (2) Be consecutively enrolled as a full-time or part-time student in the Program at
125 UDC to pursue an accredited master's degree; and

126 (3) Meet any other requirement determined by UDC to be necessary or
127 appropriate for Program participation.

128 Sec. 5. Fiscal impact statement.

129 The Council adopts the fiscal impact statement in the committee report as the fiscal
130 impact statement required by 4a of the General Legislative Procedures Act of 1975, approved
131 October 16, 2006 (120 Stat. 2038; D.C. Official Code § 1-301.47a).

132 Sec. 6. Effective date.

133 This act shall take effect following approval by the Mayor (or in the event of veto by the
134 Mayor, action by the Council to override the veto), a 30-day period of Congressional review as
135 provided in sections 602(c)(1) of the District of Columbia Home Rule Act, approved December
136 24, 1973 (87 Stat. 813; D.C. Official Code § 1-206.02(c)(1)), and publication in the District of
137 Columbia Register.
